ERRATA

Generally, the *University of Baltimore Law Review* publishes two issues per volume. Many of our subscribers, however, have already received Volume 26.3, which is a Special Issue entitled "Symposium—Developments in International Commercial Law." Because Volume 26.3 is a special printing, it is not consecutively paginated to Volumes 26.1 & 26.2. As such, an irregularity may occur when citing to pages within the range of one to eighty-seven. To rectify the inconsistency, the *University of Baltimore Law Review* has made the following resolutions:

- (1) For citation purposes, Volume 26.3 supercedes the first eighty-seven pages of Volume 26.1. Thus, a cite to 26 U. BALT. L. REV. 1-87 corresponds to pages one to eighty-seven in Volume 26.3; a cite to 26 U. BALT.L. REV. 88-300 corresponds to pages eighty-eight to three hundred in Volume 26.1.
- (2) If you intend to bind the issues into one volume, the appropriate order for pagination would be 26.3, 26.1, then 26.2.
